There will be a Wahunsenakah Lodge <u>friendship token</u> given to all conclave who participate in our exhibit. This token has to be <u>earned by participation</u>.



# New Lodge Flaps:



Many of you know of the theft in December of over \$2,000 of the lodge trading post deposit from the Christmas Banquet. Although the thief was not caught, the deposit has been restored in full because of your Scouting spirit and insurance. Nearly every one of the Scouts and Scouters who had written checks to the trading post reissued those checks for the original amount! There were even some outright donations! Insurance paid less than half of the amount, but the deposit was repaid to the exact penny!! THANK YOU ALL.

Old Kecoughtan flaps will be available in the trading post until the supply is exhausted. They are \$3 each and seven hours service in the old Kecoughtan Lodge. This is the only way service hours from old Kecoughtan may be redeemed. Service hours from Wahunsenakah Lodge may only be redeemed for Wahunsenakah service flaps.

The final issue of a Kecoughtan flap (45th anniv.) will continue to be available through Saturday evening of the Spring Ordeal to former Kecoughtan members whose '96 dues are paid and who participated in at least one lodge event in 1994-95, on the following basis: the first flap is no charge and two additional flaps may be purchased for \$5 each with no service hours required. After Saturday night of the Spring Ordeal brothers who initially qualified may purchase two additional lodge flaps.


#### Letter to the Editor:


