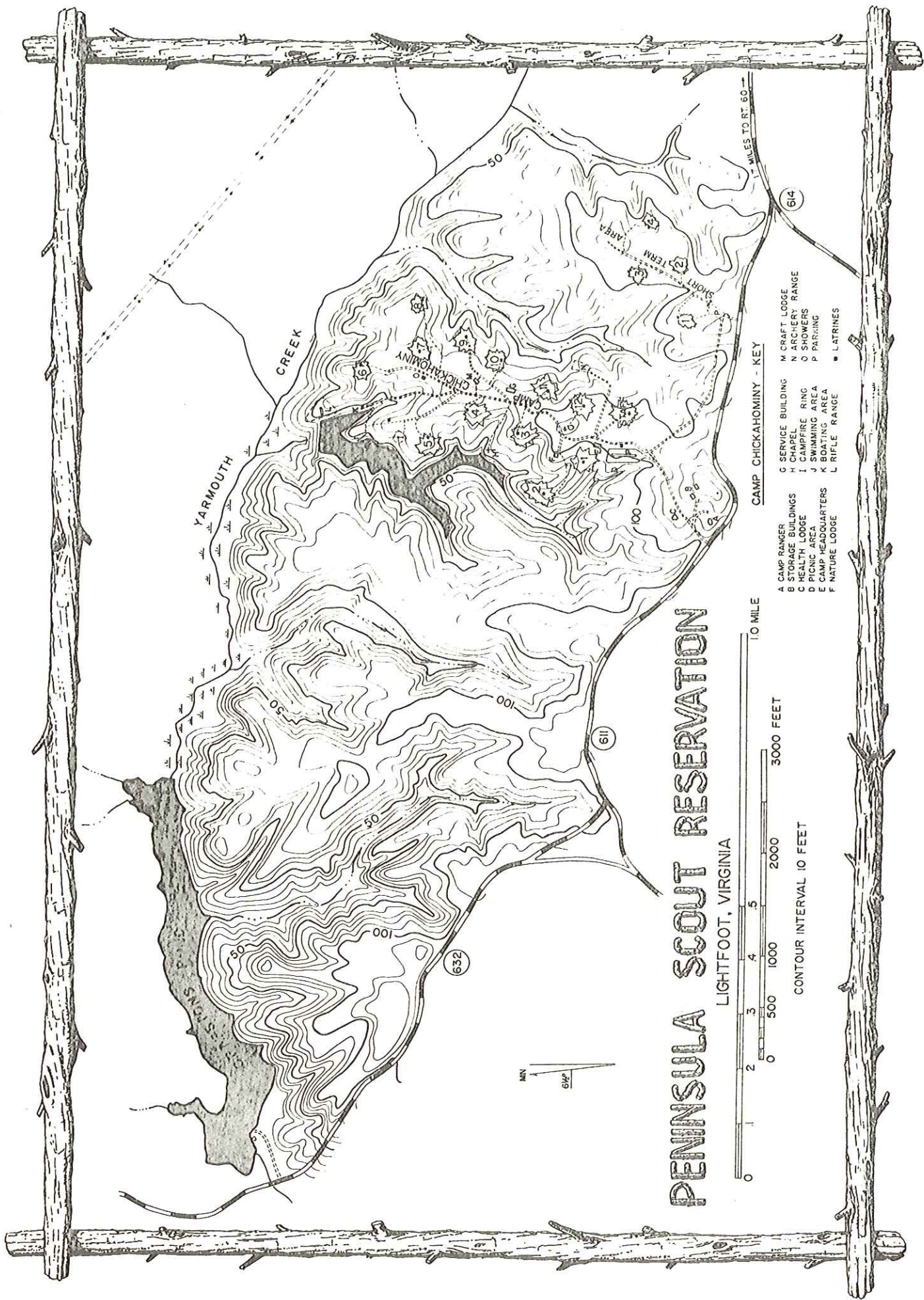

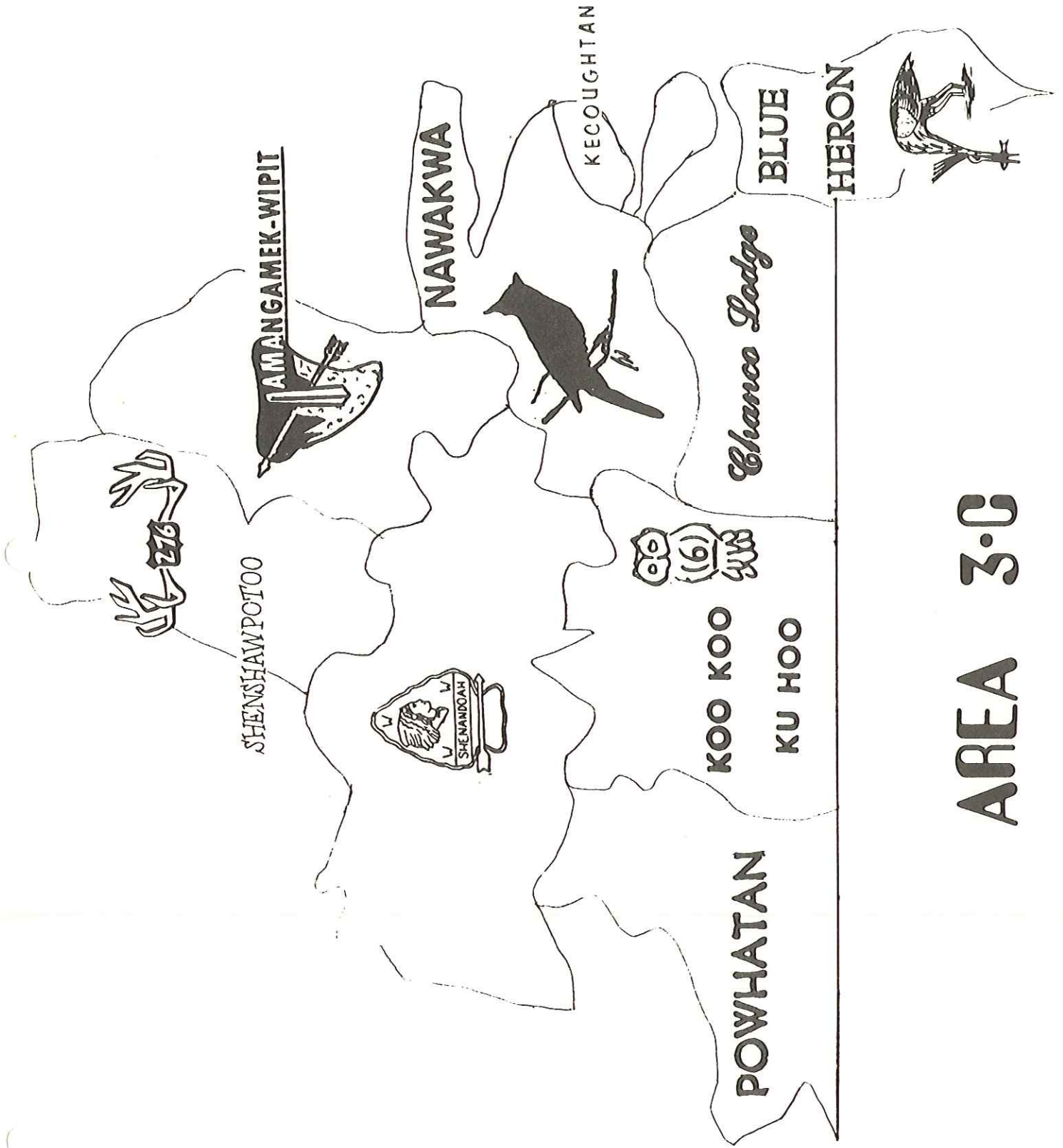

A WORD ABOUT OUR HISTORY

Kecoughtan Lodge #463 was founded on June 14, 1951, when 14 Scouts and 2 Scouters were administered the Ordeal by Blue Heron Lodge at Camp Waters, Virginia. The name of the Lodge comes the Indian tribe which welcomed the first permanent settlers to North America in what is now known as Hampton, Virginia, part of our Council and Lodge.

The first Lodge patch, issued in 1951 was a small red and green arrowhead with an arrow near the top and an acorn in the center. The Lodge name framed the acorn; and the initials, "W W W" defined the three corners of the arrow-point portion of the arrowhead design. The acorn, which became the Lodge Totem, gave birth to the Lodge motto, "From the little acorn the mighty oak tree grows." This was symbolic of the young Scout maturing and furthering the Scouting movement. The arrowhead signified the straight true course of Scouting and the ties of the Order to Indian lore.

In 1953, as the Lodge grew, a pocket flap was designed and put into use. It contains as its main points 3 acorns and two Confederate flags. The acorns, the Lodge Totem, serve as backgrounds for "W W W" and remind us of the 3 parts of the Scout Oath and the 12 points of the Scout Law. The flanking Confederate flags signify both the past and the future. They remind us that we are entering a future in which labels cannot be trusted to reveal the worth of an individual; and at the same time they recall bravery, integrity and self-sacrifice. The black background stands for the confidential nature of the ceremonies of the Order; and the silver lettering and edge denote the brightness of an Arrowman's spirit which causes him to be guided toward service toward others over service to self. The first Kecoughtan flap had a cut edge. Since 1956 all have had merrowed edges, further signifying the unbroken Brotherhood chain. The flap design has not changed since 1953; however, minor variations in size and shape have been experienced as suppliers changed.

1960 brought a Lodge neckerchief of light blue cloth mounted with an arrowhead-shaped patch at the apex. The patch shows the 3 ships of the Jamestown settlers (symbolizing the part the lower peninsula of Virginia played in the founding of our country) and the Lodge Totem, an acorn. The original specifications for the neckerchief patch remain unchanged, but the outline has been distorted gradually through the years until one can hardly recognize the shape as an arrowhead.

Having gained knowledge of our first Lodge emblem, one can easily see the significance of the 1972 Pow-Wow patch, Kecoughtan's first. In its center is a literal reproduction of the first Kecoughtan emblem. The "20" at the bottom shows this to be the 20th Anniversary Pow-Wow.

Kecoughtan has approximately 500 members in 4 chapters which coincide geographically with the Council districts: MATTAPONI CHAPTER - Colonial District - Williamsburg, Poquoson and the counties of York and James City; WENDAMEN CHAPTER - Northern Star District - counties of Gloucester and Mathews; KISKIACK CHAPTER - Western District - Newport News; and PAMUNKEY CHAPTER - Hampton District - Hampton

Kecoughtan is a Charter National Standard Lodge, dedicated to remaining National Standard through the end of the "Boypower 76" period.

NATIONAL STANDARD LODGE PLAN

To qualify for national standard lodge status each year and to do its part in BOYPOWER '76, a lodge must achieve the following goals:

- a. 50 percent of eligible lodge membership must qualify as Brotherhood members.
- b. Camping promotion committee in each lodge to help carry out the council camping-promotion plan.
- c. Hold an annual lodge (and chapter) officers' training conference.
- d. Have a current where-to-go camping publication.
- e. Publish a regular (at least quarterly) bulletin.
- f. Maintain current membership and financial records.
- g. Hold annual membership elections in every eligible unit.
- h. Have representatives attend national Order of the Arrow conference and area fellowship training conference.
- i. Place emphasis on the following objectives—
 1. A Boy Scout or Explorer today, a Scouter tomorrow.
 2. Advancement beyond First Class.
 3. Each Arrowman to recruit one new boy into Scouting annually.
 4. Correct wearing of the uniform through personal example.
 5. Perpetuate authentic American Indian culture and traditions.
 6. Improvement of Ordeal, Brotherhood, and Vigil Honor ceremonies.
 7. Promotion of professional Scouting as a career.

The Order of the Arrow must meet the challenge of BOYPOWER '76 by making sure that every Arrowman, every chapter, and every lodge are prepared to do their part.

EACH YEAR THAT YOUR LODGE QUALIFIES IT WILL RECEIVE THE SPECIAL NATIONAL STANDARD LODGE CHARTER.
