CONCLAVE HEADQUARTERS

The Camp Sinoquipe office building is the Conclave Headquarters for the entire weekend. A member of the Conclave Committee will be on hand at all times for your convenience. All registration information will be kept here.

TRADING POST

The Trading Post, which will be open from 7 a.m. to 2 a.m. and closed during all meals, is located north of the dining hall. All kinds of candy, chips and other assorted goodies will be on sale. In addition you will be able to purchase Conclave patches, neckerchiefs, mugs and other supplies.

MEDICAL SERVICES

Our Health Lodge is manned 24 hours daily. Stop in if you need help or just to say "hello" to our fine medical staff. If you are currently taking medication, please bring it to the Health Lodge Friday night and we will take care of it for you.

LOST AND FOUND

All lost and found items should be taken to Conclave Headquarters. If you have lost something check for it there.

FELLOWSHIP AREA

The Fellowship tent will have lights, shelter and picnic tables for your convenience to trade patches, hold informal discussions, and general fellowship. This area should be used instead of the dining hall to facilitate preparations in the dining hall.

The Camp Chapel area will be available throughout the weekend and will be used for Protestant and Catholic services on Sunday Morning.

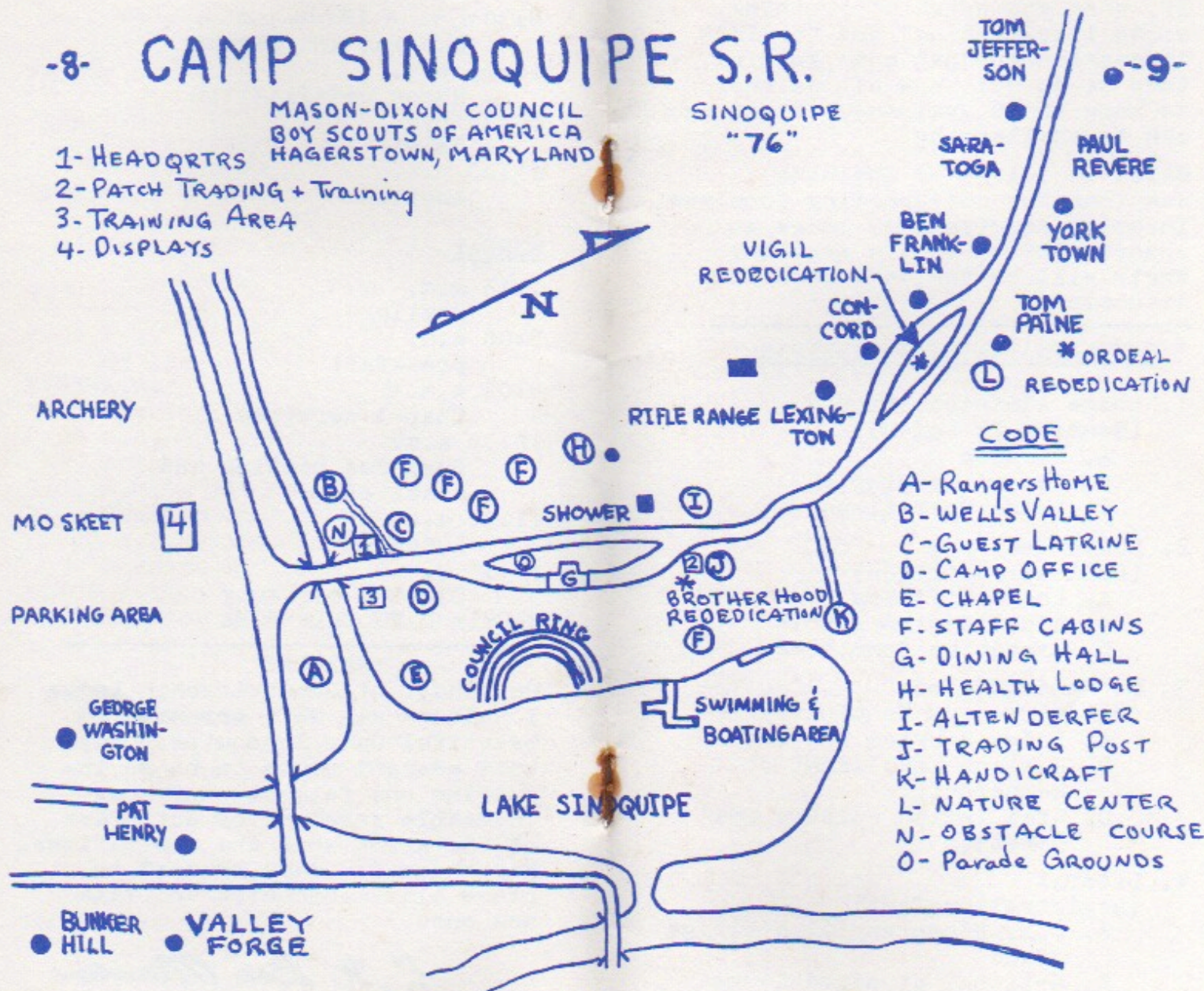

SE 1 HISTORY

In the fall of 1972 areas 3-A, 3-C, 3-E, & 3-F came together to form Section One of the Southeast Region, Order of the Arrow, Boy Scouts of America. The newly formed section made up of 12 lodges was led by Chief Tom Webb, Vice Chiefs Mike Parish, Chuck Bailey, Leader Bob Alvis, Advisor Bill Dillard, and Director Robbie Robinson. The section met for the first time in November 1972 in order to finalise the joining and plan the 1973 conclave. In March 1973 the section again met and adopted the National Rules as well as put the finishing touches on the 1973 conclave. Then in April of 1973 Section SE 1 held its first conclave, hosted by Shenshawpotoo Lodge. This very successful event ended with a completely united section. In August 1973, Section SE 1 attended the 1973 National O/A Conference held in Santa Barbara, Cal. The April 1974 conclave was hosted by Chanco Lodge. Once more SE 1 was brought together for training and fellowship. For a third conclave, Tutelo Lodge hosted the big event in 1975. Now in 1976, "Key to the Future", hosted by Guneukitschik Lodge reminds us that our heritage lies in the past, but our future lies in the thoughts and inspirations of arrowmen devoted to service to others.

GUNEUKITSCHIK HISTORY

Our lodge was organized in 1945 while the council scout camp was located at Cowans Gap State Park.

The name which is ancient Indian spelling for the name Conococheque Creek was chosen, as the stream flows through the length of our council area.

The rattle snake, then native to our scout reservation, coiled down the shaft of the arrow was adopted as the totem.

Lodge brothers have been very active at Sinoquipe since 1948. Projects include our Chapel and Alter, extensive tree planting, new ceremonial ring, rifle range, visitors latrine, extensive remodeling of the camp office and quartermaster, J. Warren Large Nature Lodge, renovating of Council Ring, repainting interior of dining hall and acquiring 31 new tables, bath facilities for Wherritt Lodge.

When there is a job to be done at Sinoquipe, the Guneukitschik brothers are first to be on the scene.
