














Committee heads complain they don't have enough members to do their job well. Lodge functions are sparsely attanded. The 1974 Lodge Officers Training Conference was declared a dismal failure because of (what else) poor attendance. Phoning Committees had to scrap and beg to get the minimum number of people to attend the Christmas Banquet without the Lodge losing money. Does it tell you anything?

Each Ordeal we induct upwards of 50 members into our Order, of which, if we're lucky, maybe 10 will become active in the Lodge and Chapter. That's a pretty bad average. Twenty percent.

Maybe its time we quit making excuses and did something about it. Saying, "We've always had a problem with attendance," or "I guess it was a bad weekend for a Training Conference," or Ordeal, or Fellowship, or Committee meeting, or Chapter meeting or....the list is almost endless.

Maybe the reason that these new members don't participate is that they don't know they are needed. Show them that your Committee needs them to work well, that your chapter needs them to be number one, that Kecoughtan Lodge needs them to operate well. Maybe then Committees will be able to do their job better, attendance will increase at all meetings and Lodge functions, and the number of Active Arrowmen will increase dramatically...all because some one let these new members know they were needed.





ceremonies the crowd traipsed through the




Sunday morning brought chapel and the business meeting, featuring orientation for the






