



1979 GOMGLAUE BEPOBE

Camp Siouan was the sceme for the 1974 Section SE 1 Conclave April 26 - 28, and Kecoughtan sent a mighty delegation. The delegates motored to the big event in Troop 2's "Hess Hotel" bus, driven by (who else?) Andy Hess.

Arriving at the reservation the delegates were warmly greeted by a walking peanut (actually a Chanco Arrowman). Then the "Mighty Acorns" of 463 discovered their camp and went off to the Dining Hall for patch trading and Brotherhood.

After a short night's sleep, the Arrowmen were given a great breakfast by host lodge, Chanco. Immediately after breakfast, the men of 463 went off to put up their display, which was made by Bill Irwin and associates. Then it was off to the training sessions. These sessions provided a wealth of knowledge to all. Even lodge "nobody" Andy Hess learned something. There were various classes on all aspects of the Order of the Arrow.





When lunch finally rolled around it was worth waiting for, after which the 1973 National Conference Show was shown. More conferences and volleyball followed.

Being the defending SE 1 champs of volleyball, Kecoughtan looked unstoppable. With stars like Del Croom, Andy Hess, Ed Dadez, and others, the "Mighty Acorns were not Underdogs. With little trouble getting by Chanco, 463 met a powerful team in Nentico. The Acorns were defeated and Nentico went on to become champs.

After a hearty dinner, Lt. Governor John Dalton spoke to the Arrowmen. Following the talk, awards were made. "Kecoughtan Kryer" recieved a certificate of Merit for second place in Newsletter competition, accepted by Norman Effinger for Editor Glenn Chase. Bill Irwin and crew earned a Second place award for display.

Indian Dancing was a Kecoughtan stronghold. Chris Currier won first in Inidan solo dancing. Vince West placed first, and Tommy Buckingham second in war Dance. Tommy Rippburger, Tommy Buckingham, along with Chris and Vince took third as a team.

Del Croom donated a complete Section flap patch set for the Patch Auction, and it went for 103 dollars. Trading was good, with many new flap patches being introduced by lodges of the Section.

After a little trading, the delegates went to Chanco Memorial Point for the Section Show. Theme for the show, as for the Conclave, was "Weld Tightly Every Link."

The Section feast followed, with Dan "Super Cook" Thompson making fish cakes better than you have ever tasted, using his own "Eleven secret herbs and spices." The Acorns shared a booth with Blue Heron Lodge, each featuring "something from the Sea".

Sunday morning brought the elections of SE 1 officers. Del Croom of Kecoughtan was elected against strong opposition (nobody) and Bruce Sanders of Blue Heron defeated Bill Keyton of Shenshawpotoo for Section Chief. No candidates were nominated for Section Vice - Chief, so this position will be filled at a later date by the new Chief, Sanders.

The Annual Business Meeting followed, with Section staff and Lodge reports. One of the highlights of the Conclave was a live telephone conversation with the founder of the Order of the Arrow, Dr. E. Urner Goodman, from an O.A. Conclave in Florida.



EVERY ARROWMAN'S RESPONSIBILITY

Sure, you love to camp. Of course you look forward to cooking over an open fire or swimming in a mountain stream. You know what its like. You have done it many times before and you don't regret one mom - ent of your experience. Not only that, you're not just an ordinary camper; you are a member of the Order of the Arrow. No one needs remind you of that.

But think for a moment. Think of the guys that have never been camping in their lives. Think of what they're missing. Some of them may be members of your troop. Others, lik the twins up the block, or the kid around the corner, have a <u>real need</u> for the experience and self - reliance gained from camping. Yes, think for a moment as to what they're missing.

The Order of the Arrow's main purpose is to get these boys camping. In 1973, our Area of the Southeast Region had 34,226 Scout campers in its camps. This was over an ob - jective of 30,820. The Region recognizes the importance of the Order of the Arrow in ach - ieving our Camping goals. So there is another thing we can be proud of, but it is not en - ough. It's time we did something about mak - ing every troop a camping troop, every Scout a camping Scout. But no mighty god in the name of the Order of the Arrow is going to do this. It has to be done on the individual, personal levely. Every member from that Vigil to the Ordeal has to get on the ball now!!!

But more specifically, what can you do about it ? That's just it, you can do plenty; and its your obligation to do it. For example: (1) Talk camping as fun in your troop or post, emphasize the benefits gained as well; (2) GO CAMPING at every opportunity and serve as a model Scout and camper, inspire younger Scouts and urge them to go camping. (3) Make sure your troop has camping planned as part of the program and make these plans materialize, be sure your troop keeps an accurate record of all its outings. (4) Help your troop plan for a long term camp or stay at the Council camp in the summer and see that proper promotion is held. get your troop to sign up and reserve a place. (5) Talk to parents and adults about Scouting's camping program, get them behind it. (6) Support the O.A. and urge other Arrowmen to promote these ideas in their units.

Go out and promote camp...its every Arrowman's responsibility.

Very few experiences in a young boy's life equal the thrill of THE FIRST SUMMER CAMP (provided of course that the camp is well established, well equiped, well staffed and well run). But what a disappointment that week can be if things are not right. That's where the O.A. comes in! We hold the balance of impact on how "well" all of those things turn out. You can supply the details from your own experiences.

There is another aspect of camp success that may not be so clear in your head. It has to do with gettings Scouts into camp so they can have that super-experience. Let me ask each of you two questions:

"Is your troop going to Summer Camp this year?" - - - and follow that with, "Is every boy in the troop going with it?"

If you can answer "yes" to both or those questions, don't pat yourself on the back, look around. You'll probably find a troop nearby that can use help getting to the same happy point. If your answer is "no" to either question, get busy! OK?
