





"Official" OA Name Tags Available



The Intertribal Dance will be held on Friday at 7:00 PM at the Native American Events Area located at the tipis on the CTBS Lakeside Field. This event is open to all who wish to participate (regalia is encouraged but not required), and observers are more than welcome to attend.

An intertribal dance is an excellent opportunity not only to join dancers from other lodges but also for novice dancers to learn from their more experienced brothers. Intertribal dances have long been a part of Native American tradition.

In addition to the Intertribal Dance, Arrowmen from Wahunsenakah will be offering Native American themed training during Saturday morning's training periods. The scheduled sessions include information on different dancing styles and types of regalia and costumes, things dancers should and should not do, and the much-anticipated presentation of Native American foods and cooking techniques. All of these training events will be at the Native American Events Area on the CTBS Lakeside Field.
