### Do You Have an OA Troop/Team Representative?

It's now official: The Order of the Arrow troop representative has been approved as a youth leadership position in the troop. This Scout serves as a youth liaison between the troop and the local lodge. In his troop, he serves as a communication and programmatic link to the Arrowmen and adult leaders and Scouts who are not OA members. He does this in a fashion that strengthens the mission of the lodge and purpose of the Order. By setting a good example, he enhances the image of the Order as a service arm to his troop. The troop representative:

- Must be under 18 years of age
- Must be an OA member in good standing (dues paid)
- Is appointed by the Senior Patrol Leader with the Scoutmaster's approval
- Reports to the Assistant Senior Patrol Leader
- Serves as a communication link between the lodge or chapter and the troop
- · Encourages year-round and resident camping in the troop
- Encourages older-Scout participation in high-adventure programs
- Encourages Scouts to actively participate in community service projects
- Assists with leadership skills training in the troop
- . Encourages Arrowmen to assume leadership positions in the troop
- Encourages Arrowmen in the troop to be active participants in lodge and/or chapter activities and to seal their membership in the Order by becoming Brotherhood members
- · Sets a good example
- Enthusiastically wears the Scout uniform correctly
- Lives by the Scout Oath, Scout Law, and OA Obligation
- Shows Scout spirit

By implementing the troop representative program, lodges can expect to see participation by Arrowmen increase and higher brotherhood conversion rates. This new role will also increase the opportunities for youth Arrowmen to stay active in the OA and to continue providing leadership and service in their troops. Scouts may use this new position to meet the leadership requirements for the Star, Life, or Eagle ranks.

Wahunsenakah Lodge is getting ready to attend its fifth Conclave as a lodge. The 2000 Section SR-7A Conclave is scheduled for the weekend of Friday, April 28-Sunday, April 30, 2000 at Camp Rock Enon, in Gore, Virginia, near Winchester, Virginia. Lodges who are members of our section are: Blue Heron Lodge 349, Nawakwa Lodge 3, Tutelo Lodge 161, Shenandoah Lodge 258, Shenshawpotoo Lodge 276, and Wahunsenakah Lodge 333. The registration and pre-order deadline for our lodge is January 31st. Registration and pre-order forms were initially available at the Fall Fellowship weekend and were available on the lodge's web site. This year's conclave, hosted by Shenshawpotoo Lodge 276, will include training workshops, competitions, patches, great food and everything else that we have seen at past Conclaves. The election of the 2000-2001 Section SR-7A Officers will be held at the conclave as well. The drive is a bit far, and will take several hours, but the camp is in a beautiful area of the Commonwealth of Virginia, and the ride should take us through some great scenery and the great outdoors.

#### WINTER ORDEAL to be held February 25-27, 2000

## 2000 National Order of the Arrow Conference

This year's National Order of the Arrow Conference will be held at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville. The conference, which runs from Saturday, July 29 -- Thursday, August 3, 2000, is one day longer than past NOAC's. This year's event marks the third time that the NOAC will be held at UT, but the first in Wahunsenakah's history. The initial registration deadline for our lodge (which requires a \$50 deposit) was set for January 15. However, the deadline has since been extended to February 15. At the last count, 20 youth and 25 adult members had registered to attend. There is a strictly-enforced 2 to 1 ratio of youth to adult Arrowmen at National Conferences, and therefore, we need 30 more youth to sign up to attend in order to allow all 25 adult Arrowmen who are registered to attend. If no more youth sign up, this will mean that 15 adults will be out of luck. If you are a youth Arrowman and are interested in attending this summer's NOAC, sign up before February 15. #### 2000 National Order of the Arrow Conference



The 2000 National Order of the Arrow Conference is scheduled for July 29th through the August 3rd, 2000 at the University of Tennesee, Knoxville, TN. The national fee has not yet been announced. Even though the the fees have not yet been set it is time to get your name in the hat to go. It is expected that the total registration (National Fee + Lodge Transportation) will be less than \$400 for youth, and \$435 for adults (however this is contingent on what the National fee will be as well as van rentals.

Since we have not received any information, we do not know what registration restrictions will be placed on us other than that a 2:1 ratio of youth to adults, will be enforced.

To secure a place in the Lodge Contingent, fill out the information below, and submit to the Council Office No Later Than Saturday, January 15, 2000 with a \$50.00 deposit. Registrations will be taken on a first come, first served basis (two categories, < 21 and >21). If for any reason, we have to make a cut on participants, the deposit will be fully refunded. If for any reason you have to drop out once the initial registration has been sent to National, then deposits and fees will be refunded if a replacement is found.

Final Registration Fee amounts, and payment schedule will be forwarded to those submitting this reservation form as soon as the information is available. Act now, time will definitely slip up on you if you don't.
