# Hurricane Isabel Hits Virginia Hard.



#### Worst Hurricane in over 100 Years.

Hurricane Isabel and its aftermath have put the state of Virginia, through a lot. Many have lost homes and shared hardships from Isabel.

Isabel was the size of Colorado, packed hurricane- force gusts ranging from 74 to 107 miles per hour. Bring thousands of trees down in yards and roads. Extraordinary amount of rain-washes away piers and anything in it way.

The storm knocked out 1.8 million businesses and homes from electric power, roads blocked trees fell on homes and flooded many areas. This has to be the worst storm in 100 years or more.

Like most places, Camp Chickahominy was hit hard, where it has closed the camp till this winter or spring. The insurance claim adjuster has looked at the camp and now the council is working on a plan to get the roads back open.

The Lodge Website, was the first to put out the word about camp and asking folks to take care of your families and homes first. In due time, we will have the right folks up at camp to review the damage and to come up with a plan.

Hundreds of trees down or partially down throughout the camp. You can not tell where the roads are sometimes for all the trees down on the roads. The council reported, that the Following buildings are without damage, Ranger House, Warehouse, Administration Building, Dinning Hall, Powhatan Shelter, Pebbles Aquatics Building, Scout Craft Shelter, Rifle Range, Swimming Pool (minor fence damage only) and Boating Area. In the COPE area, the climbing tower and small climbing wall are both okay, but the rest of the COPE area has major damage. The rest of the building and shelters and several of the campsite pit latrines, picnic tables and tent platforms have damage. While most have structural damage, most of them are repairable.

No building off of their foundations and Power was restored a few days after the storm. Ranger Joe, has turned some of the areas off for safety.

Scout Executive Dick Collins and Ranger Joe, have walked the camp and working on a plan to get us back in camp as soon as it is safe for all of us to enjoy the camp. Till then, Camp Chickahominy will have to stay closed to everyone until it is safe. We cannot take the chance of anyone getting hurt. The council will let the lodge know when and how it can help with camp. Till then, Please stay out of camp. Thanks to Herb Smith and this reporter, This newsletter will have a few pictures of the camp for you to see. These pictures show examples of what camp looked like, a few days after Isabel came knocking on the door of our Camp Chickahominy.






### Ranger Joe Report to the Lodge
























### Fall Fellowship 2003

#### MEMORIES OF AN ORDEALIE

Friday was a time of anticipation. The time finally came that I had dreamed about and waited for with excitement. When I first arrived at camp, and the apprehension started to set in. A concern over the unknown began to mount. Not knowing what was about to happen brought an uneasy feeling. Sure I knew what other scouts had told me about being out at night, no talking, and of course the hard work. However, this was still unsettling because of the unknowns. The strangers, even though they were Arrowmen, were going to take me off to some unknown place and do undreamable acts to me.

Kichkinet, the guide, seem like some sort of helpful one. Maybe he was truly going to help along the trail - he said so anyway. The Elangomat might be OK, at least he was always with us, for good or bad. He made us stay together, gave abrupt instructions, and tries to keep us busy, He was the one familiar face that stayed around when everyone else was coming and going, at what?, I do not know.

The meals were not so bad, but if they wanted us to do all that work, they should have fed us better. Keeping quiet was probably the most difficult thing to do. Every now and then a word gets out of your mouth. Most of the time you catch yourself in mid-sentence, but other times its out before you know what happened. There were times of boredom. You would think that they could keep you busy so that time would pass faster. It seems disorganized, but they must have known what they were doing since they have done it all before.

There were some times when I got to think about everything going on around me. There was a certain warm feeling. I thought about how I got there - doing what was necessary to advance in scouting and working with the patrol. The Ordeal seems like some sort of reward for all of that.

When they let me clean up and get ready for the ceremony, the tiredness really

sunk in. All of this strange activity and people began to wear on me. The other candidates were really dragging. I hoped it wouldn't go on much longer. The little bit of food for dinner was disappointing, but at that point it didn't really matter. All I wanted to do is to get through this ceremony and go to bed. It seems like waiting and not knowing what is next is the real Ordeal.

The ceremony was mysterious. I had never seen anything like it - the candles, costumes, the unknown faces on the hill, and the sashes hanging on a rail. I didn't know what to do when these Indians direct me to do so many things. There seemed to be only darkness, the arrow, and the faces behind me. It was hard to listen to all the instructions. I felt like I was stumbling through the ceremony, but realized it was important that I follow everything, because I felt they might single me out to do something. I was concerned that I might not respond quickly, and would be embarrassing.

When the Chief shook my hand, it seemed like I had finally made it. Being one of the few maked me feel special, being chosen then began to have meaning. overwhelmed. The fire gave me a certain high. What a moment - I was chosen to be honored and its great! Just wait to see those guys back at the troop when they see me. All of a sudden the faces behind me rushed down to the circle to join in the singing of the song. Everyone wearing the sash. Everyone was smiling and shaking hands. Relief sets in and it was all downhill from there. I can take anything now. I didn't know I could meet the challenge, but it really wasn't that hard. I can see that anyone can make it if they just try.

This is a big responsibility. I wonder if I'm up to it? I might be chosen, but this is a big job. They expect me to do a lot. One thing is for sure, when I go back to the troop I want to be a better scout. Putting that flap on means the others expect more from me and I am going to deliver.

#### ORDER OF THE ARROW AT PHILMONT.

The Order of the Arrow is offering you an opportunity to join other Arrowmen in cheerful service and the formation of lasting brotherhood on the trails of Philmont Scout Ranch. Under the direction of the Philmont Conservation Department, experienced Philmont staff members with strong Order of the Arrow backgrounds will lead participants on the two week trail crew and trek.

The program is a fourteen day experience. The first week focuses on trail construction and maintenance under the guidance of Philmont trail crew foremen. The second week is a seven day backpacking trek that is designed by the participants. The program is not simply building trail and hiking though, the OA Trail Crew is ultimately a journey that challenges Scouts mentally, physically, and spiritually.

Trail building is tough. The worksite experience is full of long, strenuous days requiring a great deal of physical effort. Participants are expected to work with great diligence as the trail that is being built is designed to last over 75 years and protect the beautiful landscape of Philmont Scout Ranch. Other than trail building techniques,

Scouts will strengthen their leadership skills, learn advanced wilderness and low-impact camping skills, observe and participate in group wilderness safety, good judgment, and motivation activities, and receive special OA instruction.

The project's mission is to maintain, reinforce, and enhance the purpose of the Order of the Arrow by using Scout camping traditions. Participants are expected to use their experience to benefit their troop, chapter, lodge and council programs. Camping is a method of Scouting that enhances and builds stronger programs and people.

#### REQUIREMENTS

- Be at least 16 years old the day your program begins, but not 21 by its conclusion. Be physically fit, able to lift and handle materials up to 50 pounds. (Philmont height and weight guidelines will be strictly enforced.)
- Be a registered member of both the BSA and a local OA lodge.
- Scouts from the same unit, or otherwise acquainted, will be placed in separate crews. No Exceptions!

#### **HOW TO APPLY**

Complete the application, have it approved by both your Scout Executive and Lodge Adviser, and receive permission if you are under age 18. Mail your completed application and \$25.00 deposit to:

Order of the Arrow **Boy Scouts of America** P O Box 152079 Irving, TX 75015-2079.

The Order will begin notifying applicants of acceptance by March 14, 2004. Following receipt, a packet of materials will be sent to you to assist in preparing you for your experience a Philmont. Applications will be accepted after March 14 until all slots are filled.

#### PROGRAM COST

Participant cost is \$125 for the two week experience. A \$25 non-refundable deposit is required with the application. The balance of the fee is due at the time of acceptance as a participant in the program. Additional expenses, including travel to and from Philmont as well as miscellaneous purchases, are the responsibility of the participant.

Those applicants not accepted as participants in the program will have their deposit returned. Participants canceling acceptance will be eligible for a refund if notification is received to the national office by May 14, 2004. No shows are not eligible for a refund.

I want to thank all who helped clean up from Isabel. I have heard good things about helping your neighbors and community. Thank God for the Boy Scouts, to come through.
- 8. Camping Promotions We need to get our Lodge Where to go Camping Guide out to the units and help promote the best camp in Virginia, Camp Chickahominy.
- 9. Communications This is got to be improved as a whole. We have a web site and newsletter that looks very good, but we are not supporting this committee, as a whole. I think as a lodge, we can do better to keep the web site updated and the newsletter. I need youth members to write articles for the web site and newsletter. We each need to take a hard look at getting information to the web site and duck calls. Lets take five minutes to write up what our chapters are doing and yes lodge reports from the officers too.

#### LEADER QUALIFICATIONS

**Scoutmaster and First Assistant Scoutmaster** 



Have served as a Scoutmaster for at least one year during the three-year period prior to July 1, 2005; have completed basic Scoutmaster training; participate in a prejamboree training experience; file a personal health and medical record prior to the prejamboree training; be approved by the local council. (Although not required, Wood Badge and/or Scoutmaster's Key is a desirable qualification.) The Scoutmaster must be able to serve as a role model of physical fitness.

### **SCOUT QUALIFICATIONS**

Boy Scouts and Varsity Scouts must be at least First Class Scouts. They must have completed the sixth grade or be at least 12 years of age by July 1, 2005, but not have reached their 18th birthday by August 3, 2005. All Boy Scouts and Varsity Scouts must participate in a prejamboree training experience; file a complete Personal Health and Medical Record prior to the prejamboree training; have been active in a troop or team for at least six months prior to July 1, 2005; and be approved by the unit leader and local council.

Wahunsenakah Lodge has a dues structure of \$7.00 per year when the dues are paid on time (November 30 of the year preceding the year for which the dues are assessed). A late fee of \$1.00 is assessed if the dues are not paid by November 30. Check the mailing label. If the upper right hand corner does not have 2004 or later, you should pay 2004 Wahunsenakah Lodge dues by November 30, 2003. An Arrowman who was previously a member of the Wahunsenakah Lodge and did not pay 2003 dues should pay the delinquent dues for 2003 (\$8.00) and the 2004 dues (additional \$7.00 if paid by November 30, 2003 or additional \$8.00 if paid after November 30, 2003) at the same time. 
