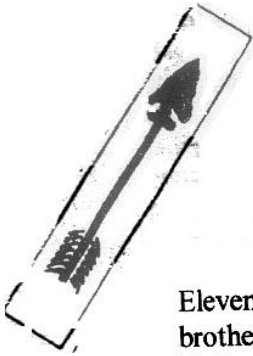
Now it was time for cheerful service, helping Ranger Joe with tasks that only arrowmen and arrowwomen can do.

After the ceremonies were all done, the candidates joined the brothers at the cracker-barrel. Man, can those candidates put food away.

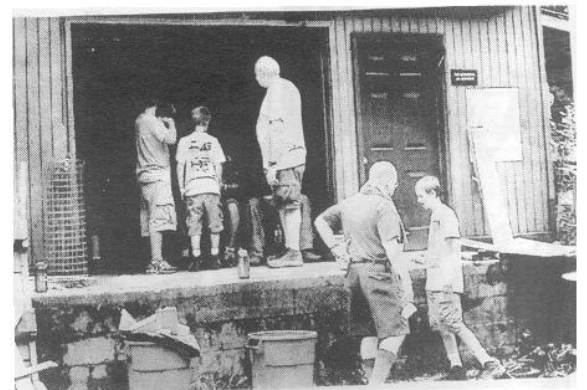
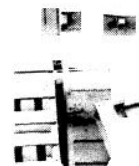
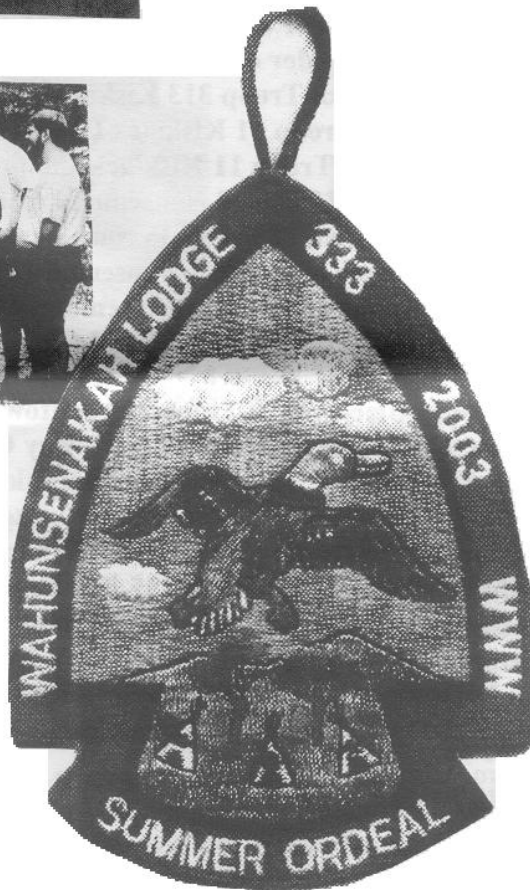
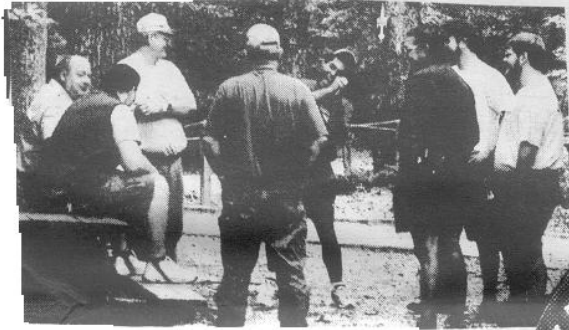
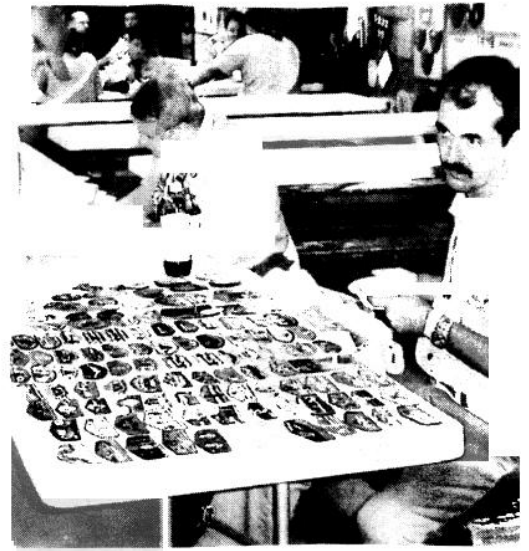
Now after eating some ice cream and cookies, time for Mr. Lewis to do the patch auction, to help the camp fund.

At the lodge business meeting, committee chairmans explained there duties for the new brothers and then the chief went on to old business and new business.

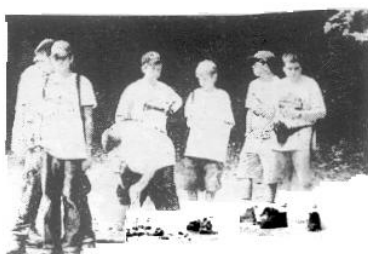
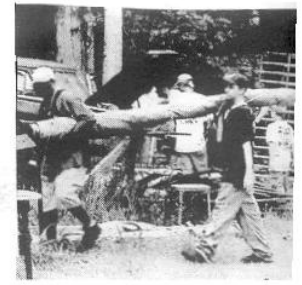

One Day is Back -
Bigger and Better than Ever!

After a one-year hiatus in 2001, the Southern Region's One Day of Service program returns this year with the promise of being bigger and better than ever.

Founded as a pilot program in 1996 in a handful of Sections in the Southern Region, One Day was implemented as a community service program to allow lodges to serve the communities where their Arrowmen live. One Day reached Region-wide status by 1998, and by 2000, every Section in the Southern Region had a One Day program.

Heading up the One Day program this year is chairman Linley Collins of Chilantakoba Lodge #397, and adviser Frank Harper of Ini-To Lodge #324. Linley is the Section Chief of SR-1, and is a sophomore at Nicholls State University in Thibodaux, Louisiana. Frank is the Section Vice-Chief adviser in SR-6 South, and is an attorney with the Griffin Judicial Circuit.

This year's date for One Day is November 1st. As in previous years, lodges will be permitted to conduct their One Day service projects on another date before November 1st if a scheduling conflict exists.

The Region plans to set new records for lodge participation and total community service hours with this year's One Day program, but will need your help to accomplish its goal. Promotional materials and award criteria will be distributed to all sections and lodges in the coming weeks, so make your plans now on how you will contribute to this year's One Day program. Together, we can and will make a difference!

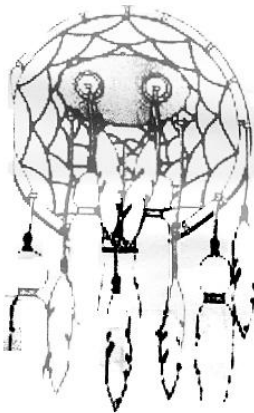

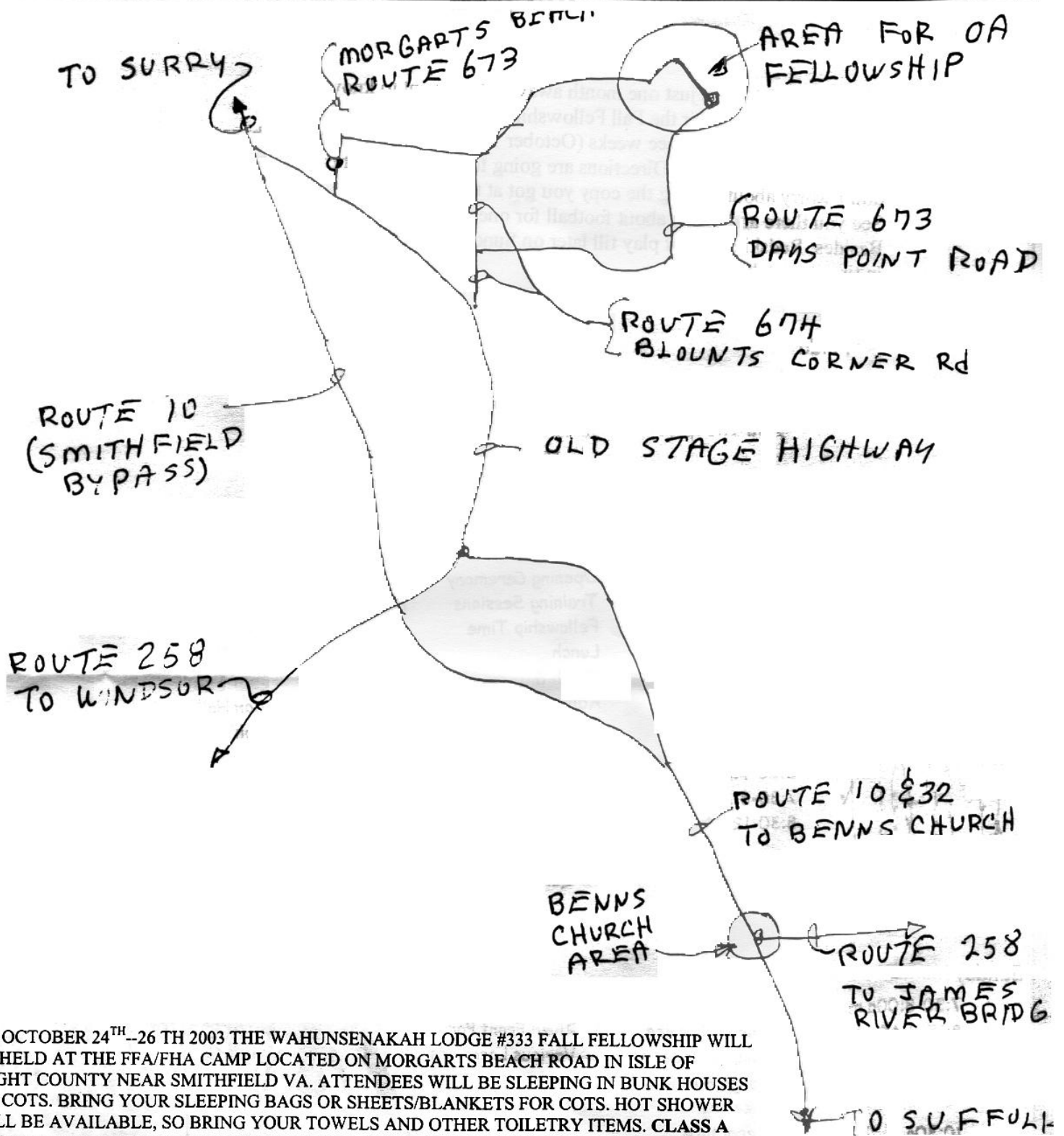

The day began with classes from 9 to 12 and then afternoon sessions were craft activities/dance activities from 1 to 5. Evening Sessions/Shows/Pow Wows went until 9 to 10 PM, and then clan meetings sometime lasted till midnight.

This was great because it covered more topics for more learning experiences.

Adult Advisor "Uncle Bob" Hardy was so good at crafts, he was asked to be on NOAC staff for next year.

Bill Athayde, our contingent leader, did an excellent job of organizing, preparing and carrying out our trip. Bill's Clan "Coup Stick" (sorta like a walking stick decorated with objects symbolizing the clan experiences at Indian Summer) was selected in the top 15 to be included in the closing show. As for me, (Doc Green), after 40+ years associated with the order, I gained a much needed appreciation for the dedication and hard work associated with the dancers and the American Indian Culture, through which our legacy of leadership and service was derived as told by the "Legend".

Other highlights of NOAC include the TOAP (The Outdoor Adventure Place), Meet the National Chief at the Council of Chiefs, and the best shows in town, the evening shows each night. The NOAC ends on what is called Founder's Day, a daylong event featuring over 400 Lodge booths from across this country and world and a parade of lodges.
