

of the Scout Law in a modernistic play all performed by Arrowmen Scouts.





## Leadership in Service Award (2005-2007)

In recognition of the Order of the Arrow's heritage of service, the National Order of the Arrow Committee created a new three-year Leadership in Service Program that was announced at the 2004 NOAC. The Order strives to strengthen Scouting's foundation of service by further fostering in Arrowmen the ethic of servant leadership. By promoting and rewarding service that benefits the Boy Scouts of America's outdoor program, and the communities in which Scouts reside, the Order will be acting to support scouting at the most important level.

#### Leadership in Service Award Criteria

Arrowmen must complete the following requirements each year in which they earn the award: ☐ Give 8 hours of service participating in a lodge, chapter, or council service project benefiting a local council camp (lodge induction weekends do count). Service may be split over two or more events.\* ☐ Give 6 hours of service doing a community service project planned and run by the lodge or chapter. [Serving at the Lodge's Carillon Service Project is one way to satisfy this requirement.] \* Working as camp staff does not fulfill the council service requirement. The timeline for the Leadership in Service Award is a graduated system that encourages Arrowmen to continue their service from year to year. Requirements for the award can be met during the calendar years of 2005, 2006, and 2007. Service from a previous year cannot be carried over to meet the next year's requirements [i.e., the 2004 Carillon Service Project may not be applied to the 2005 award]. Arrowmen of all ages may earn the First Year Ribbon Award in 2005, 2006, or 2007, the Second Year Silver Feather Award in 2006 or 2007, and the Third Year Bronze Feather Award in 2007

only. Signatures for the requirements of this award may be signed off by the Arrowman's Scoutmaster Lodge Chief, or Lodge Advisers. Arrowmen should use the sign-off form, below. Completed forms should be returned to the lodge with proper payment. The awards will be presented by the lodge at an appropriate occasion.


# 2005 Wahunsenakah Lodge Honor Member Recognition Program Form.



## **Purpose of Order of the Arrow**

The purpose of the Order of the Arrow is fourfold:

To recognize those Scout campers who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives

To develop and maintain camping traditions and spirit

- 2. To promote Scout camping
- To crystallize the Scout habit of helpfulness into a life purpose of leadership in cheerful service to others

## **History**

The Order of the Arrow (OA) was founded by Dr. E. Urner Goodman and Carroll A. Edson in 1915 at the Treasure Island Camp of the Philadelphia Council, Boy Scouts of America. It became an official program experiment in 1922 and was approved as part of the Scouting program in 1934. In 1948, the OA was recognized as the BSA's national brotherhood of honor campers and became an official part of the national camping program of the Boy Scouts of America. Today, the OA is recognized as Scouting's National Honor Society.

## Membership

The OA has more than 183,000 members in lodges affiliated with more than 300 BSA local councils.

## Eligibility

To become a member, a youth must be a registered member of a Boy Scout troop or Varsity Scout team and hold First Class rank. The youth must have experienced 15 days and nights of camping during the two years before his election. The 15 days and nights must include one, but no more than one, long-term camp consisting of six consecutive days and five nights of resident camping, approved and under the auspices and standards of the Boy Scouts of America. The balance of the camping must be overnight, weekend, or other short-term camps. Scouts

are elected to the Order by their fellow troop or Varsity team members, following approval by the Scoutmaster or Varsity Scout Coach.

#### Induction

The Ordeal induction ceremony is often conducted at Scout camp and is the first step toward full membership. During the experience, candidates maintain complete silence, receive small amounts of food, work on camp improvement projects, and are required to sleep alone, apart from other campers, which teaches significant values.

## **Brotherhood Membership**

After 10 months of service and fulfilling certain requirements, a member may take part in the Brotherhood ceremony, which places further emphasis on the ideals of Scouting and the Order. Completion of this ceremony signifies full membership in the OA.

## Vigil Honor

After two years of service as a Brotherhood member and with the approval of the national Order of the Arrow Committee, a Scout or Scouter may be recognized with the Vigil Honor for outstanding service to Scouting, his lodge, and the community. This honor is bestowed by special selection and is limited to one person for every 50 members registered with the lodge each year.

## Lodges

Each Order of the Arrow lodge is granted a charter from the National Council, BSA, upon annual application by the local council. The OA lodge helps the local council provide a quality Scouting program through recognition of Scouting spirit and performance, development of youth leadership and service, promotion of Scout camping and outdoor programs, and enhancement of membership tenure.



## Order of the Arrow Involvement in the Cub Scout Camping Program

#### Benefits for the OA Member

- An Arrowman can be a role model and help a Cub Scout want to be like him
- An opportunity for an Arrowman to demonstrate and practice leadership and camping skills before an appreciative audience
- An opportunity for OA members to promote camping
- Arrowmen can help assure the future of Boy Scouting (more than 90 percent of Boy Scouts were Cub Scouts)
- An opportunity for OA members to provide cheerful service to Scouting

#### Benefits for Cub Scouts

- An opportunity for Cub Scouts to see older Boy Scouts in action and want to be like them
- Cub Scouts can see camping skills demonstrated by an older youth instead of by adults
- An opportunity for Cub Scouts to participate in quality outdoor programs
- Cub Scouts can see themselves as future Arrowmen and be encouraged to continue in Scouting
- · Cub Scouts can have fun with older boys closer to their age than the adult leaders

#### What the Order of the Arrow Can Do

Sponsor a day event for Cub Scouts

OA members could sponsor an outdoor event for Cub Scouts and their parents. They could demonstrate outdoor skills and the Cub Scouts could experience some hands-on activities. This event could increase the comfort level of leaders and parents who are not campers. It could also lead to increased participation in pack and other outdoor events for Cub Scouts.

#### Assist during BALOO training

OA members could serve as instructors and provide equipment and demonstrations for many of the training sessions

#### Become the liaison to the feeder packs

OA troop representatives could become liaisons to the feeder packs associated with their troop by providing assistance as needed.

#### **Promote Council and District outdoor funtions**

OA members could promote district and council outdoor activities that are geared to the Cub Scout level. Ideally, they would also lend assistance at the events.

#### Provide direct assistance on pack campouts

OA members could assume the role of den chief on a pack campout. They could be involved in the planning, execution, and evaluation of the event.

#### Serve as a camping resource for pack leaders

The OA members could present camping demonstrations and promotions at roundtables and pack meetings. Also, the OA could assist packs in obtaining necessary equipment for the activities, or providing information on where equipment may be obtained locally for rent or purchase.

#### Manage or develop a "where to go" booklet for the packs

As the OA already does this task for the troops, it may be a natural fit for the OA to publish a guide for Cub Scouting. Help with Cub Scout camp work weekends






#### **EDITOR'S NOTES**
