Congratulations to our new brotherhood members and for making history as the first brothers to go thru the Brotherhood Ceremony at Bay Port Scout Reservation.

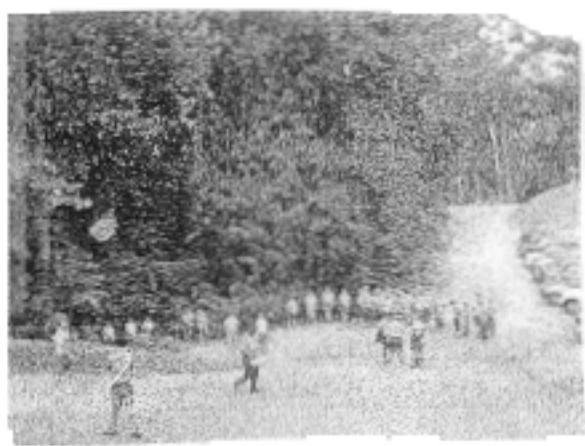

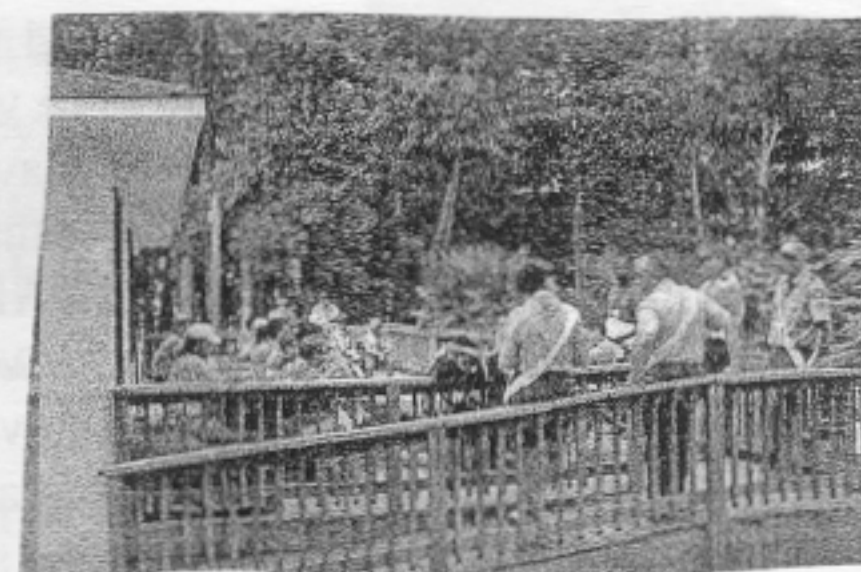
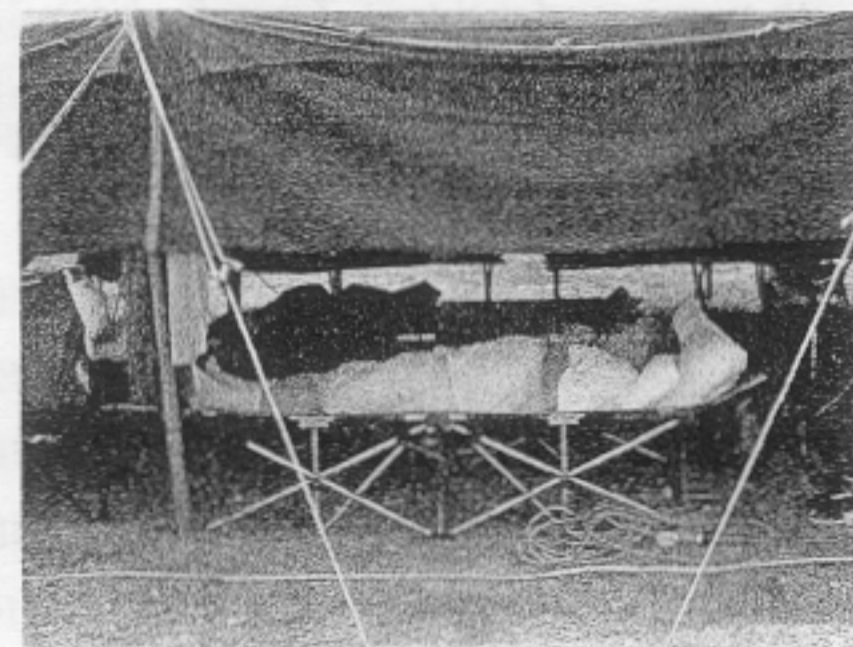
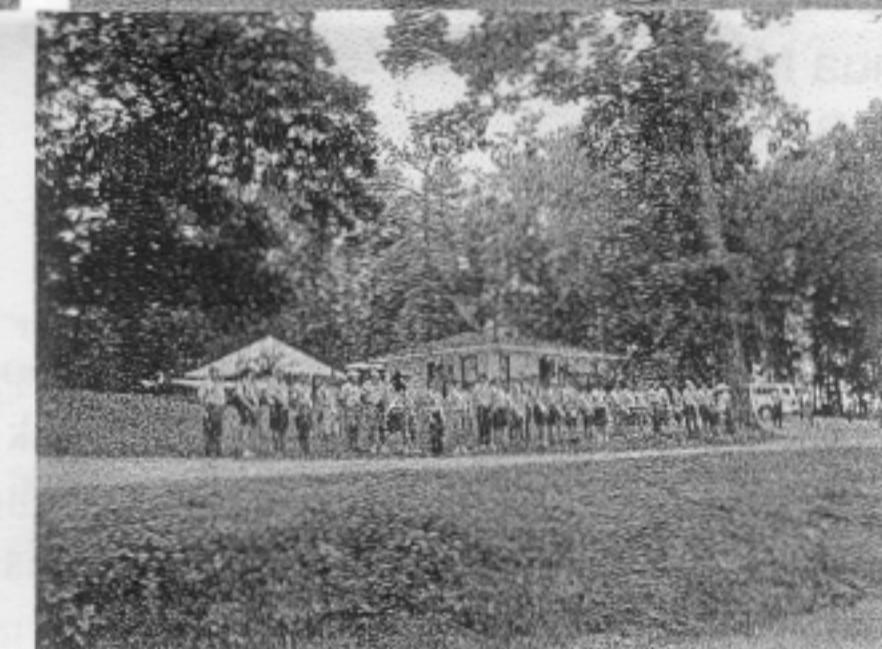
After a long day, the lodge enjoyed the cracker barrel and watched a few bidders bid on some patches in the patch auction.

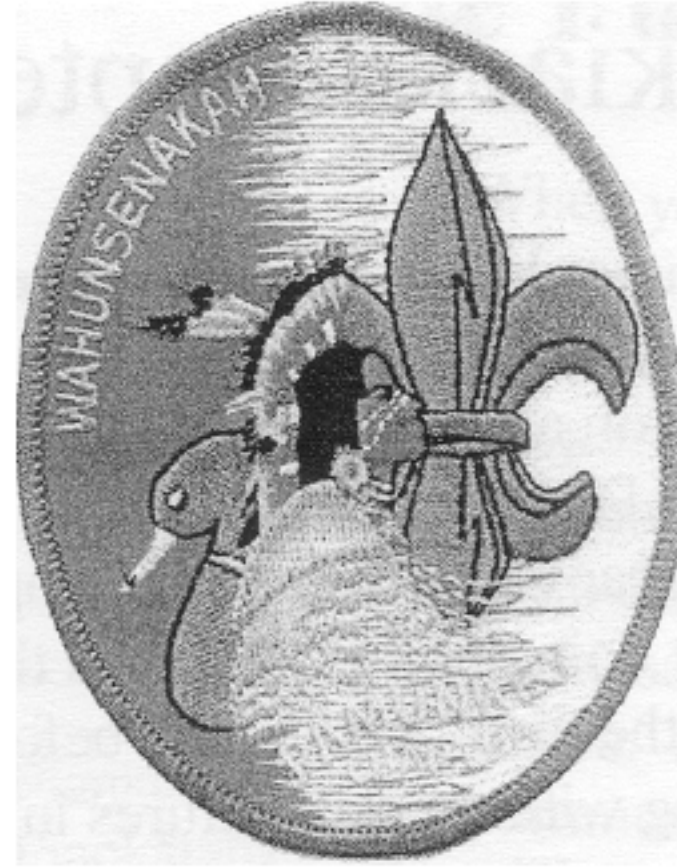
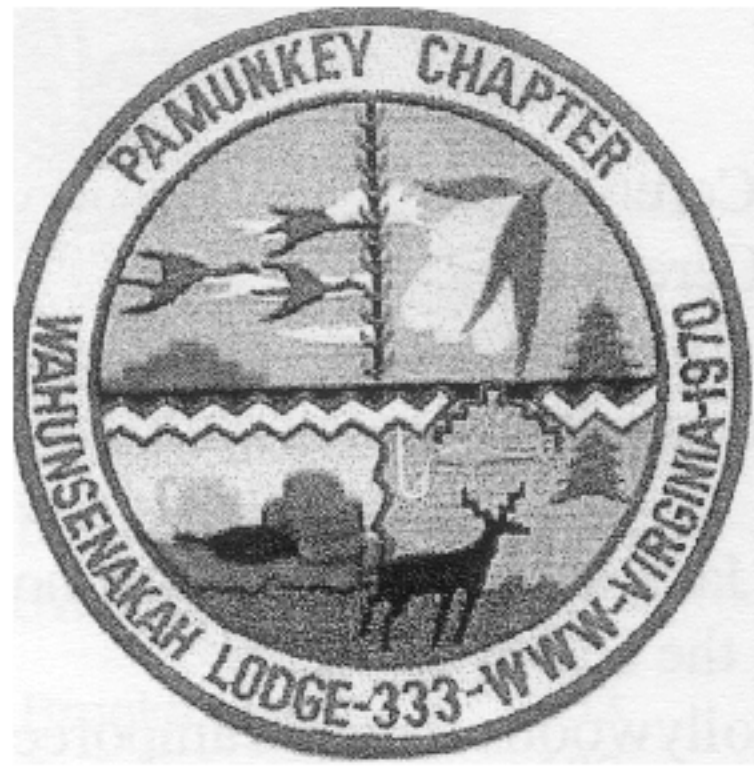
## Piankatank Chapter

## Adviser's Minute



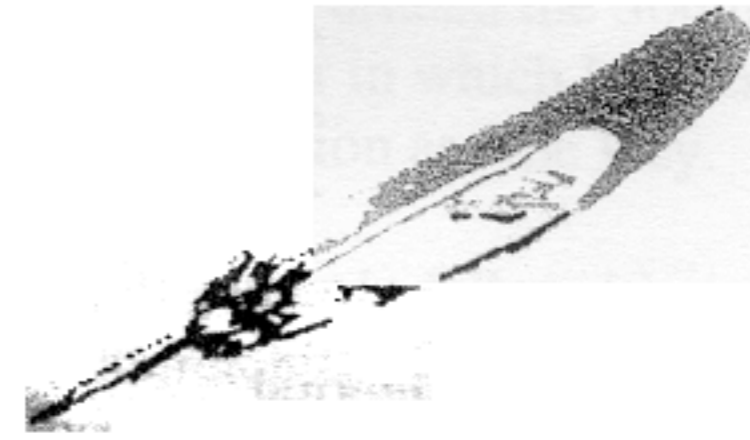
